Bottom line: 1 out of 2,000 birth mothers requested no contact.

## Notes:

Adoptees requesting their original birth certificate represent a range from 3.1% to 18.8% of unrelated adoptions.

In these 4 states, only 109 birth mothers requested no contact, or five-one-hundredths of one-percent, which equates to 1 out of 2000.

\*\*\*\* Alabama-born adopted persons, whose original birth certificates were sealed, may obtain a non-certified copy along with all other documents in the file. While most of these requests are from adopted persons, others (who had a legal determination of paternity causing their OBC to be sealed) have also made requests to open sealed files and are included in these counts. Requests for no contact are not tracked, but in 2007 they were estimated to be 3 or 4. Four was used in the calculation.

<sup>\*\*</sup>Historically, *in-family* (related) adoptions have accounted for approximately *half* of all adoptions world-wide; therefore, the other half are unrelated. By definition, in-family adoptions were not confidential.
